

National Garden Railroad Convention - Portland, Oregon

Cheri and I flew to Portland Oregon on Tuesday August 27th to attend the National Garden Railroad Convention held at the Double Tree by Hilton Hotel. That afternoon we took UBER to Lake Oswego to ride the Willamette Shore Trolley line that went from Lake Oswego to the Portland South Water Front District. The trolley is a reproduction of the type that ran on the line in the early 1900's. The line covers six miles following the West bank of the river. The track was originally part of a Southern Pacific Branch Line that ran to downtown Portland. One interesting aspect of the line is that many upscale homes have been built between the tracks and the river bank. This proved to be a problem for home owners who have to park their cars on a steep embankment on the other side of the tracks from their homes. In order to get groceries, furniture or new appliances from cars or from a delivery van, they have to cross over the tracks at the nearest pedestrian crossing and carry items to their homes. To solve this issue, home owner have built carts with wheels the same gauge as the track. They load their supplies carts at the crossing and wheel them down to the back doors of their homes. On the ride we met seven railroad enthusiast from Scotland who flew over and rented a nine passenger van for the event. They were kind to us to give us a ride back to the hotel after the trolley ride was done. Once back at the hotel we met up with Mike and his grandson Jake, who helped drive trailer while Renee and Jake's wife Afton flew, to make arrangements for the following day. Clinics were scheduled during the late afternoon and early evening ranging from building road bed, mountains and structures, to 3-D printing.

at the hotel and we drove 29 miles two view Multnomah Falls, the number one tourist attraction in Oregon. The falls measures 620 feet, making it the second highest in the United States. At the base of the falls is the Information Center and a Gift Shop. Visitors can hike a quarter mile up a pretty easy trail to a concrete bridge that replaced an old log bridge in the early 1900's. This bridge goes over a section of the falls providing a spectacular view of the river below. For railroad buffs, it also allows us to see Union Pacific trains running on our side of the river while the BNSF trains are running on the opposite side. More energetic hikers can cross over the bridge and follow steep trail to top of the falls. After viewing the falls we traveled to Gary and Janette Lee's "Baker and Grande Ronde Railroad" a must see. Their home is located in a rural area. Their log home sits on a hill with a large porch on two sides offering views the railroad as well as the natural setting. When we arrived we were directed to a full size barn where Gary has

constructed a large yard to store trains. He has numerous hand build structures to include a roundhouse and turntable. Being an inside modeler for thirty years, I has intrigued with how he utilized this space. There is an opening at one end of the staging area that leads to their large detailed outside layout measuring 175' x 60' with 600 feet of mainline track. They model the 1890's and describe the railroad as a fictional narrow gauge branch line that connects to the Sumpter Valley RR at Baker City, OR. The railroad was featured in the April 2013 Garden Railroad magazine. After spending time enjoying the railroad we traveled back to Portland to pick up the trailer, go to the hotel and set up in the vendor hall. John Carl and Walt Smith along with Jake and Afton Kidman helped set up the display. That evening attendees could attend the BBQ so no clinics were scheduled.

Thursday morning we invited friends from Vancouver, WA to join us to tour some layouts. They had limited knowledge of G Scale, their only exposure was seeing one of my trains running on a large loop of track at our home at Sun City Festival in Arizona. We toured three layouts that morning. The first was located on a steep bank overlooking a small lake. The layout consisted of over 1,000 feet of track on multiple levels with numerous bridges to include a hand build Bascule Bridge. It also included many hand build structures. The second layout was featured in the 2014 Garden Railroad magazine. The plan was displayed along with numerous pictures taking during the construction process. It featured multiple loops that overlapped each other utilizing a series of tunnels. The third layout included long runs from the small town of Rocky Top USA, a restored gold rush town, to the town of Canyon City. The 1959 era of Rocky Top featured a visit from President Eisenhower seated in his presidential limousine with Secret Service agents running along side. After seeing these layouts we went back to the city for lunch then bid our friends farewell. The Ice Cream social was held that afternoon prior to the opening of the exhibits.

Immediately after the Vendor Hall was opened, the Reindeer Pass booth was swamped with customers. Mike and Renee had the largest area at the show and even then people had to line up outside the booth area in order to pay for their purchases. Renee was seated at her table greeting people taking payments and looking up prices on her computer if they were not already on the boxes. Mike was busy dealing with customers who were buying Air Wire, batteries, Revolution control systems and answering all types of technical questions. Cheri helped Renee by bagging items after they were rung up. John Carl worked at the round-a-bout containing small items

and also the Egg Liners on top as well as helping with track and switches. I was in the Piko, USA and LGB areas helping people purchase rolling stock and engines. Walt Smith sat near the display of the more expensive items such as the Accuraft Galloping Goose and LGB Snow Plow. The booth was full all evening from 4:30 to 9 pm. I doubt if many train buffs went to any clinic sessions due to the constant crowd we witnessed in the Vendor Hall.

Friday morning Mike and Renee went to layouts on tour. Cheri and I decided to take a trip downtown to Powell's City of Books, the largest independently owned bookstore in the country. Powell's store takes up a full city block. It has three levels with both new and used books. It has a full room for history buffs that includes a section on railroads. We spent three hours looking around then crossed the street to have lunch, then back to the hotel to help at the display. The Vendor Hall was open from 2 pm to 9 pm. The second day was nearly as hectic as the first. Numerous attendees stopped to purchase additional items or in some cases to just visit. Our Scottish friends were back as well as a young couple from Germany and train enthusiast from all over the US and Canada. Clinics were on the agenda from 3 to 6 pm. The Banquet was held Friday evening as starting at 5 pm. Many do attend the banquet to hear the guest speaker as well as get an opportunity to visit with the organizers of the convention.

The last day of the convention included layout tours in the morning, clinics in the afternoon and an opportunity to run or watch live steam being run at Staver Locomotive, a large indoor and outdoor table high layout. Once again the Vendor Hall was open 9 m to 4 pm, but this day the general public was invited to attend. We were busy right up to the last minute. Reindeer Pass is a classy operation. Renee and Mike combine their strengths to make customers feel important and welcome. They know the business and have built a loyal following from not only the US but many other countries as well.

Cheri and I have attended at least fourteen conventions over our time in G Scale. All have been different, some better organized than others, some with many large professionally built layouts, some with small layouts but all have been fun. We have met many fine people who enjoy their trains. If you get a chance to attend the Nashville Convention in 2020 or the Denver Convention in 2021 by all means do it.
